ALL SET TO BATTLE TO THE LIMITS

OF MACHINERY, MUSCLE AND NERVE

The cut and thrust of Grand Prix scrambling really hits the top today for not only have we the usual mustering of powerful overseas talent, but the home entry—unquestionably Britain's strongest available representatives in this class—are split three ways from the centre . . . each group dedicated to achieving indisputable victory and, if need be, ready to dispense with team tactics if a chance of personal success is offered.

It must give the foreigners immense pleasure to see the British contingent so obviously at each others' throats. Perhaps only among the Swedes does a similar situation occur and even with them, as with the Britons, the Czechoslovakian CZ concern has succeeded in forging a widening split among fellow-countrymen. This is not an adverse comment on CZs, rather a compliment that they have won over so many top-flight riders simply by producing competitive machinery.

From the purely sporting point of view—as we spectators will see today—it couldn't be better. Manufacturing giants from West and East Europe, backed by their fantastic resources of development research, capital and manpower, and the privateering specialists like the British Rickman brothers and Sweden's small, but highly efficient Lindstrom organisation, all dicing for one of the plums of the 14-meeting world series that cannot fail to produce a scrambling spectacular.

In Jeff Smith, the Lancashire-born Birmingham-based reigning world 500 c.c. champion, we have the greatest rider ever to grace the moto-cross scene. He is a brilliant tactician, a first-class engineer and, when the stress of the day's racing is over, a humorist with a sparkling turn of satirical wit, and has done as much as anyone to increase the international popularity of this sport. With two world titles to his credit, he has proved beyond doubt that hard work and unstinting dedication are the prime factors to success.

No one has won the world crown three times. This is the tenth meeting in the series and unless the East German, Paul Friedrichs, has recorded wins in the last two Grand Prixs—in Czechoslovakia and Russia—there is a good chance that Smith will this year make history. Friedrichs, unknown outside of East Germany until a couple of years ago, surprised the world by finishing runner-up to Smith last year. And to prove it was no fluke, on the very nippy CZ, won the first three of this season's GPs with only Rolf Tibblin (Sweden) and Vlastimil Valek (Czechoslovakia) at first able to give him a race. He slipped a little, but flashed back to form on his home GP circuit with yet another brilliant win. He is the man

Smith must be certain to beat if the Englishman is to keep an interest in the world crown.


Two other foreigners could give Smith a very rough time today. Sylvain Geboers, a dashing young Belgian who did remarkably well last season on a British Matchless, but is doing even better now on a Swedish Lindstrom. He has already beaten Smith at international (non Grand Prix) meetings in Belgium and is definitely one to watch. The other is the young Swede, Jan Johansson, another from the Lindstrom stable, who scored a maximum-points win at the first attempt in the middle of May.

But it is in our own camp that the fireworks are most likely to fly. It could result in a resounding British win . . . or it could cost Britain the Grand Prix and Smith the title. This potent mixture of two factory giants—BSAs and CZs—is ready to explode at a touch. Add the British Metisse equipe with its co-directors Derek and Don Rickman ready to stir the brew and anything could happen. BSAs want a win today and the world title . . . CZ's Dave Bickers and Chris Horsfield have pledged themselves to taking the big prize back behind the Iron Curtain . . . and the Rickmans couldn't care less about the world title, but are very, very determined that they should win today, if only to show the world that privateers can produce machinery the equal—and in their case, they are convinced, better—than any vast, automated factory backed by scientists, drawing-board technicians and the best that superbly organised competitions sections can turn out.

Perhaps for the Rickmans "couldn't care less about the world title" does them an injustice. If they were not so involved producing better, faster, smarter moto-cross and racing machines then they would have more time to spend on the Grand Prix circuits and a lot of riders now enjoying a place in the sun, would otherwise be lucky to collect the left-overs!

This is the first time the World 500 c.c. Grand Prix has been staged at Farleigh Castle and the West Wilts Club, organisers for the Auto-Cycle Union will at last see the fruits of their endeavours which began months ago when they re-sited their scrambles circuit by providing racing in the opposite direction to previous events and, as was seen at the recent National Maybug scramble, making a very successful job of it. Again, the club's workers have spared no effort in getting everything shipshape. It has demanded long hours of effort and planning to give us a pleasurable afternoon's sport. I'm sure you will all join me in thanking everyone concerned with the organisation of the event, all the officials and marshals who have turned out today and, in particular, the riders and mechanics, for what I am sure will be a memorable day in the long history of British Grand Prix Moto-Cross.

A final word: tomorrow's *SUN* will, of course, carry a full report and complete details of today's Grand Prix, plus the results of all major motor-cycling events in your area.





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
