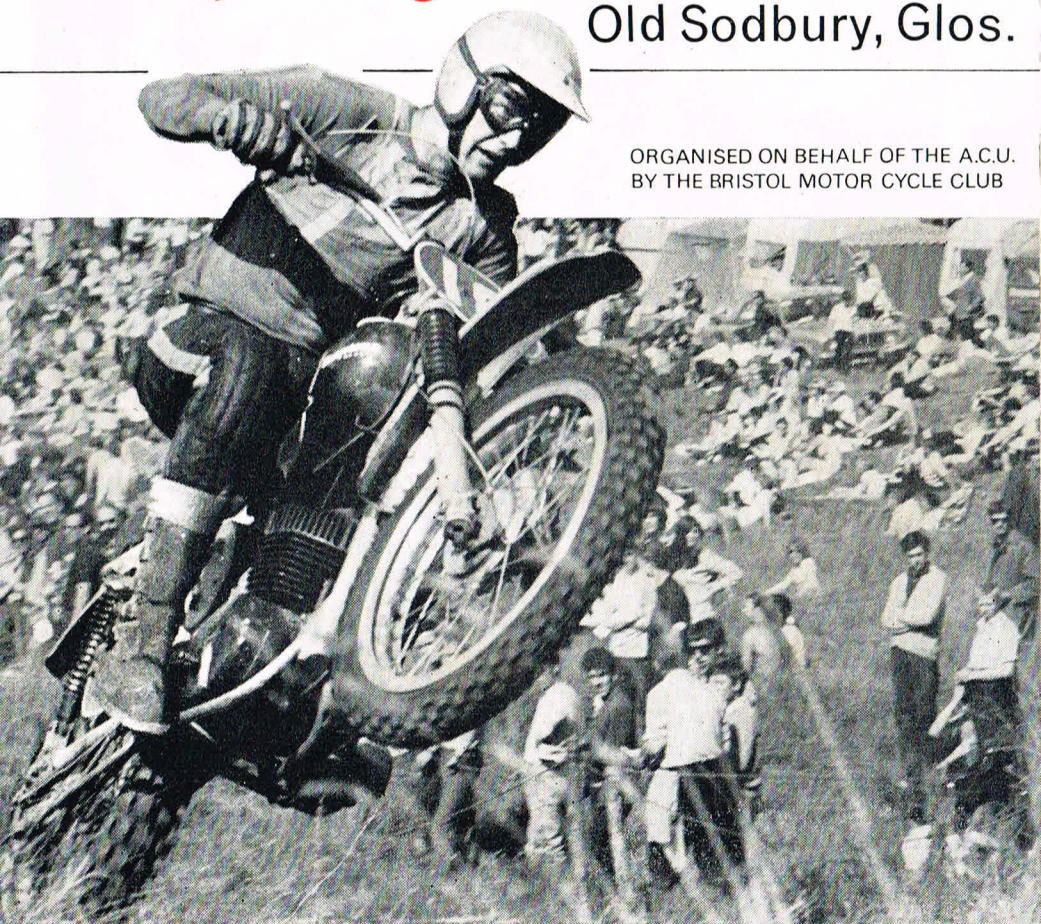

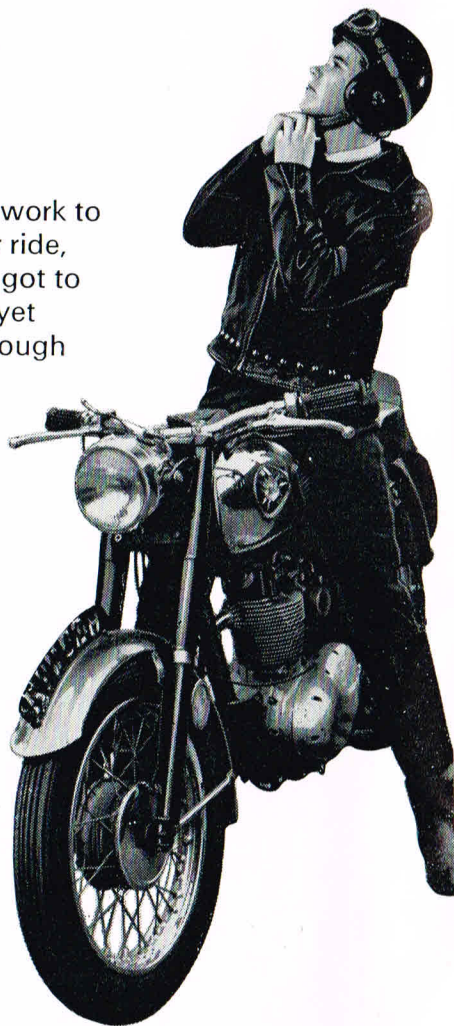

The 250c.c. Moto-Cross World Championship

Introduction

The 250 World Championship Moto-Cross series is perhaps the most international of all mechanical sports — and one of the hardest. Every year a circus of young, hard professionals treks over Europe competing in Grands Prix ranging from the depths of Russia to the holiday playground of Spain.

Today's British round at Dodington Park is the penultimate round of the fourteen meeting series and a very critical one as the final positions begin to crystalise. This type of racing is a far call from national scrambling as we know it. These riders have to compete in two 45 minute races which demand the sort of stamina a marathon runner needs, the reflexes of a boxer and the mechanical knowledge of an engineer. To have all these qualities plus the inborn natural ability that makes a world champion is a rare thing. That is why the top six in 250 Grand Prix racing are a very exclusive breed of man. Today you are seeing the world's best and the world's best at anything, whether it be tiddlywinks players or athletes, are always worth watching even if you know nothing about the sport you are watching.

Men like Joel Robert of Belgium and Torsten Hallman of Sweden travel 50,000 miles a year all over Europe and compete in anything up to 50 meetings during the summer commanding up to £150 per start.

The two main rivals this year are Robert and Hallman. Both have been at championship loggerheads for many years with Hallman beating Robert for the last two titles.

This keen rivalry is hard. Already this year two riders have suffered injuries that will keep them out of racing for the rest of the year when placed fourth and fifth in the championship table. Young Swedish newcomer Hakan Andersson was tipped to win the title after some brilliant performances but crashed when leading the Dutch GP, badly breaking his leg. Olle Pettersson also broke a leg when competing in his first season as the official works Suzuki rider. It is hard at the top, and as one time 500 world champion Bill Nilsson once said after knocking a rider off: "We don't come here to play ping pong!"

The Start

Moto cross, from the French 'moto' (motorcycle) and the English 'cross' (cross country), has boomed beyond all recognition since the 1939-45 war. Its commercial value was seriously exploited by French businessman Roland Poirier, when the Amicale Motocycliste de la Seine staged memorable meetings in the chalkpits of Montreuil, on the outskirts of Paris. Hundreds and thousands of entertainment-starved Parisians cheered Britain's pioneer moto cross men, among them Bob Foster, an all rounder who became 350cc world road racing champion in 1950, and Ted Frost, a great character who helped popularise the sport in Belgium and now runs a garage in Epsom, Surrey. Stars such as Harold Lines, an Ariel rider unofficially crowned world champion, and Basil Hall whose stardom was enhanced by a period pop song 'Ou va tu Basil?' (Where'ye goin' Basil?) stole the limelight and earned big money.

In 1952 the FIM gave the sport its first European 500 title which was won by Victor Leloup of Belgium on a 500 FN with rubber suspension and plunger rear springing.

Small machines soon gained popularity and the 250 European championship was instigated which Dave Bickers won in 1960-61 on a Greeves.

The 'Big Four'

Torsten Hallman

This tall, youthful-looking veteran from Uppsala in Sweden is the most successful moto cross rider ever. He has won one European title and three world titles — a feat achieved by no other rider in either class. He is

probably the most professional of all the riders here today and has always remained faithful to the Swedish Husqvarna factory. He has a cool temperament and always does better when the chips are down. At the beginning of this year after his win at the first round in Spain, he went for three meetings without scoring a point. Robert strode into the lead but slowly Hallman worried and caught the Belgian. A wily master of track craft whose style of riding looks deceptively slow.

Joel Robert

Joel is Mister Spectacular and probably one of the fastest men ever to straddle a moto cross machine. He is as temperamental as Hallman is not. Since flashing to a surprise championship title in 1964, Joel has been trying ever since to get it back again. He is fabulous to watch which accounts for his terrific popularity. The CZ factory desperately want him to win the title this year in order to make it a double with the 500 title Friedrichs is battling for. For sheer natural talent he is the greatest. He loves having fun and enjoys company but when racing starts he has only one thing in mind — that is to win.

Dave Bickers

There is little to say about Dave that fans don't already know. At thirty Dave has had a long and illustrious career and is known and loved in every country he travels. He has been put in this class this year by the CZ factory to help Joel win the title. In 1960 and '61 Dave won the European title on a Greeves which produced about 19 bhp — now he rides a sophisticated 32bhp CZ! Still capable of beating the best, Dave is a legend in his own time and will give the home crowd the sort of racing they love to see.

Victor Arbekov

Arbekov was Russia's first world champion. He is 27 and hails from Podolsk near Moscow. This Grand Master of Sport, the highest award in Russian sport, is tremendously fit and loves skating, football and skiing. He began scrambling in 1959 and qualified to ride in the world championships in 1964. During 1965 he won five of the fifteen rounds and took the title off Robert after a memorable season-long battle. Always smiles and loves a cigarette.

The Rest

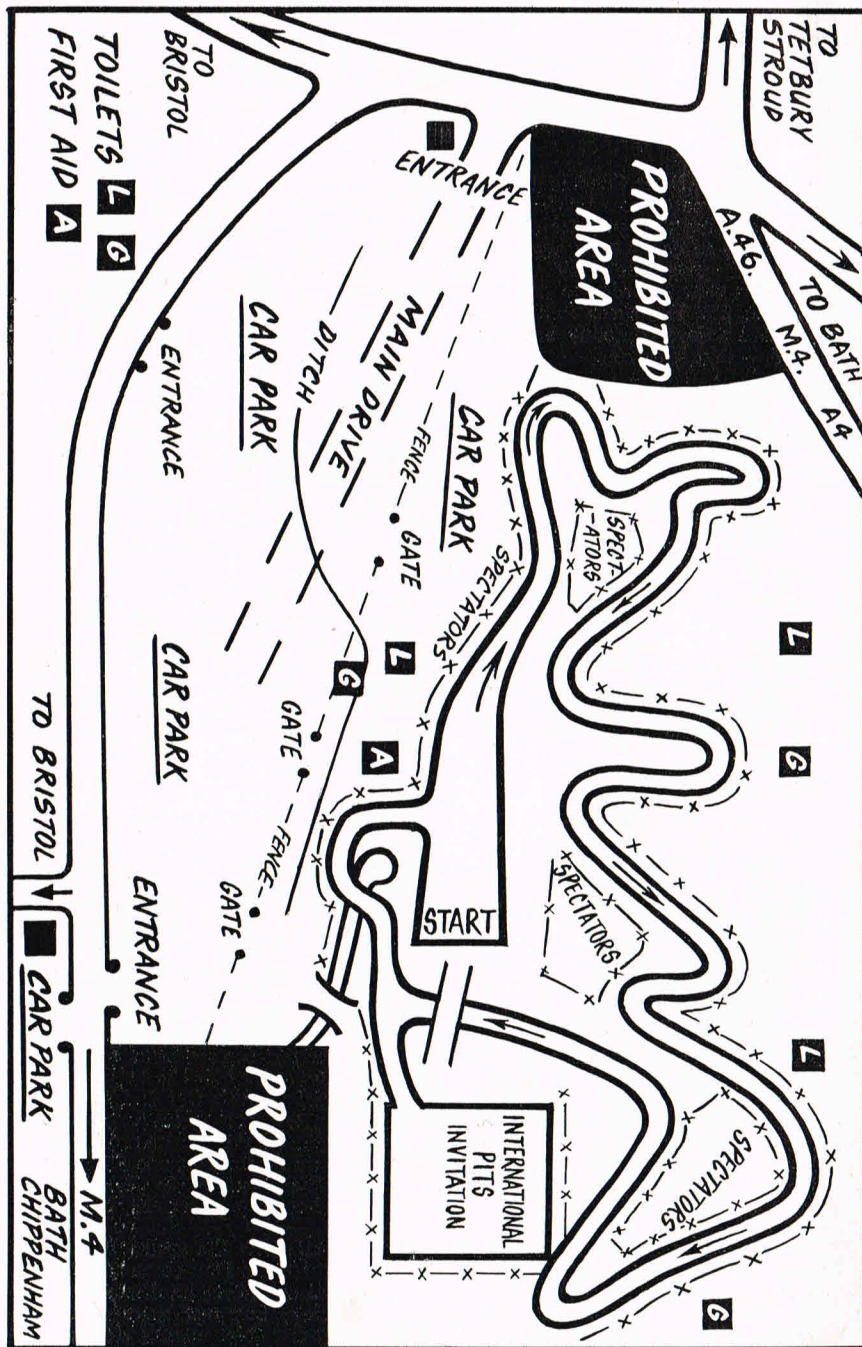
Apart from this so-called big four there are others in the title hunt likely to pull off places today.

Sylvain Geboers seems to be a veteran, he has been around so long, but he is still only 23 and rapidly reaching his peak. He rode works Matchless as a teenager but now rides for the CZ factory. Sylvain likes the sandy courses of his native Belgium best but is quite capable of a placing here. Another young CZ team man is Karel Konecny from Czechoslovakia who has shot to prominence this year. With three second places in succession in Russia, Poland and Yugoslavia, this young 23-year-old technical student caused a few raised eyebrows and will undoubtedly do the same today.

As far as home talent goes three local Gloucestershire residents will be out to gain a bit of glory. Malcolm Davis on the works AJS has had some good results in the 250 GPs he has ridden in and loves this fast and grassy course. His Stroud neighbour Andy Robertson on the works Husqvarna, is quite capable of scoring. Next year he hopes to do all the 250 rounds and last year came sixth in his first GP at Halstead on a locally made Cotton. Hoping to travel with him next year is his big mate Bryan Wade who rides for the Greaves factory. Bryan is another up-and-coming youngster, out to prove his worth.

But elder statesman Don Rickman might well show the young ones a trick or two. Despite not having ridden a 250 for months, Don came fifth on a Bultaco at the first round in Spain this year and can never be discounted.

One can't mention all the names competing, but rest assured the racing will be fantastic and there WILL be a green shirt among the first six. There is nothing I would like more than to report a British win in next Wednesday's Motor Cycle News.

In all Grands Prix points are awarded in each of the two races—1 point for the first, 2 points for the second, 3 points for the third, etc. The points gained in each race will be totalled and the winner of the Grand Prix will be the rider with the smallest number of points. In the event of two or more riders having the same total of points, then the rider who has completed the most laps will be adjudged the winner. Should there still be a tie the rider who had made the best time will be adjudged the winner. The winner on "overall classification" scores 8 Championship points, second - 6 points, third - 4 points, fourth - 3 points, fifth - 2 points, and sixth - 1 point.

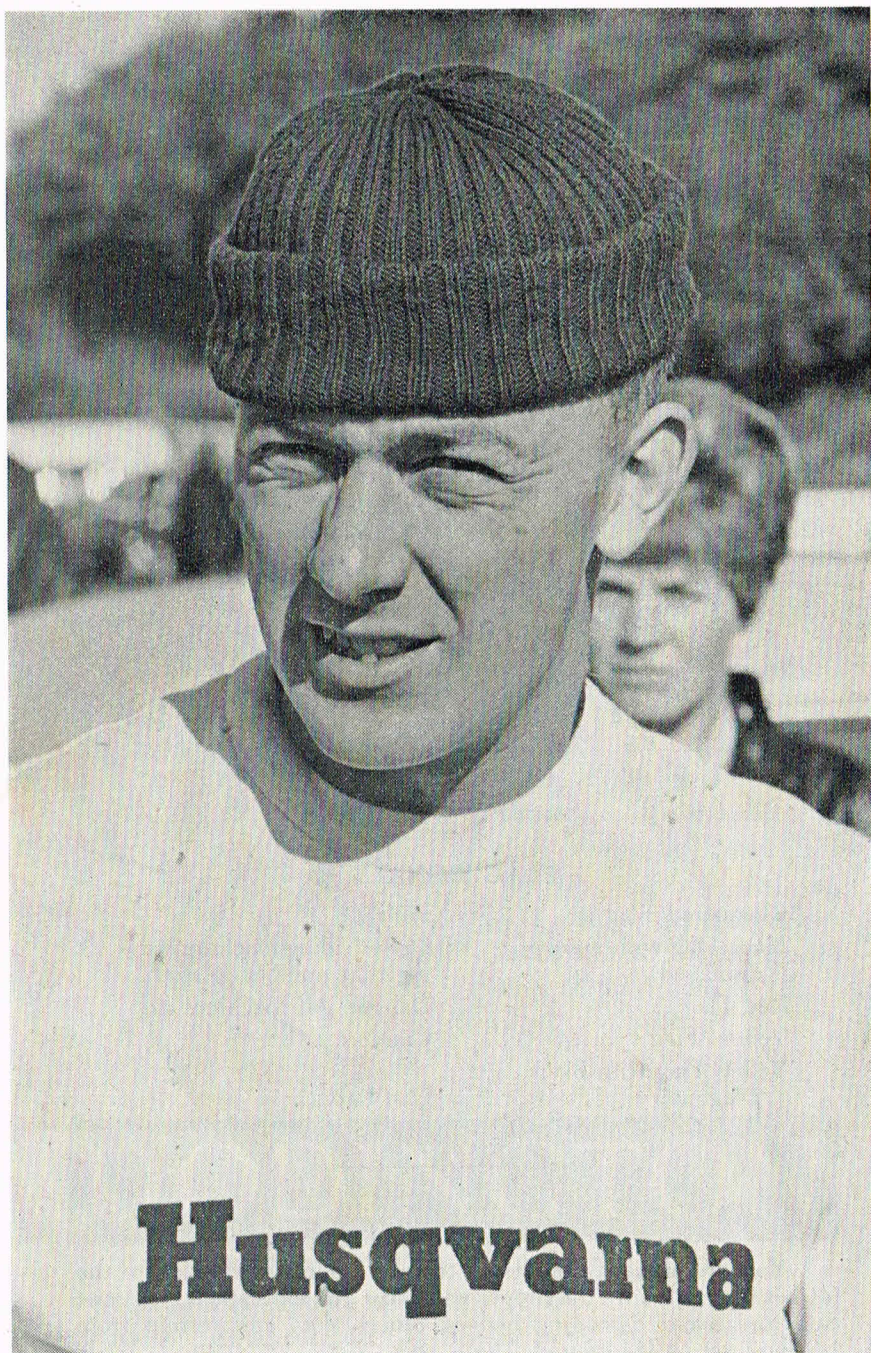
