All we try to do is put your demands into action, and we'll go on doing so. You just keep telling us what you want.



## JAPAN LAUNCH OFF-ROAL IN BRI

All-new models for Britain and a bigger range of dirt bikes mark the big challenge from Japan launched at the Dirt Bike Show this week – and there are some real sensations on the stands.





All new for the enduro scene, a Uni-trak 175 from Kawasaki, the KDX uses a mill based on the trail bike engine, and aims to upset the PE sales in the most popular class.



Yamaha are pinning their hopes on the big bore 465 motor as the flagship of their monocross range. Based on the World Championship winning Grand Prix bike, they're hoping to have Heikki Mikkola himself dropping in to introduce it.

They claim around 50 horsepower from the 85 x 82 mm engine which has a five speed gearbox.

Improvements to the already well-tried cantilever suspension system include separate reservoir capacity to aid cooling the nitrogen and oil mix.

Weight of the bike is 102 kg, and another novel feature is the twin leading shoe front brake for extra stopping power.

The biggest Japanese production two-stroke so far could prove a popular mount, especially with Neil Hudson's name backing it up.

# ERS...

#### CHES A MASSIVE AD ATTACK BRITAIN

Kawasaki are liable to ace the headlines with the new Uni-trak production range. After many denials and a lot of rumours about what they'd come up with, they've shown their up-and-down season with Brad Lackey was hardly wasted. A really purposeful 420 is the pride of the line, based exactly on Lackey's bike, with a 250 and 125 version of the same theme. The green meanies have been waiting to pull some shocks out of the bag, and these are they.

But apart from individual sensations, the most impressive feature on show is the sheer scope of the oriental onslaught, with a variety of bikes for all classes and fields, particularly moto cross and enduro. Kawasaki have a 175 unitrak enduro, a two-fifty four stroke and a full four hundred to complete a full range of alternatives.

Suzuki's answer is a new-look RM range, with the top class bike using a 417 cc motor, and the 250, 125 and 100 class bikes uprated. In addition the fantastically successful PE enduro range gets the full moto cross treatment with alloy swinging arm and FIM regulation plates, and the familiar 175 and 250 class bikes have now a bigger and much awaited brother in the PE400, using the basic 397 cc moto cross unit in a softer state of tune.

Yamaha too are in with a full compliment

of motor crossers, add to it the TY trials bikes, and now the IT range of 175, 250 and 400 enduros, and you begin to see the force of the challenge.

Honda, the world's largest motorcycle manufacturer, has not been slow to react either, and the new-look 125 and 250 CRs have a little brother in the CR80 for the schoolboys. Just as interesting, the XR250 and 500 enduro four stroke stable is boosted by the introduction of the XR200, a re-vamped version of the 185 which has been available in the States. Very light, and with a six speed gearbox, this smart little

thumper could be a winner.

# BIG BORE BIKES FOR ENDURO

The longed-for big brother PE, based on the 397 cc Suzuki power house, and with all the mean-looked accessories that make it an enduro masterpiece.



Built in the States at Kawasaki's plant in Nebraska, the KDX400 two stroke will be the PE's big rival for the hearts and minds at checkpoints.

## The 125 Class Hots up



Honda's new-look CR125 features a new engine, re-designed frame, and now a 21 inch front wheel instead of last year's 23. With a little brother in the CR80, it's bound to be hitting the schoolboy charts.

Yamaha's monoshock answer in the 125 class has a 56 x 50 mm engine and develops a claimed 26 horsepower. With a six speed gearbox, the tidy YZ weighs 85 kilos.



Kawasaki's challenger in the class is the very latest novelty with the monoshock Uni-trak system and re-designed chassis around the already successful 125 meanie motor. Weight and other details will be announced at the show.

Suzuki's RM125T has also undergone a major re-styling job around the square 54 x 54 mm engine. They claim 27 horsepower from their motor, fed by a 32 mm carb and weighing 84 kilos.








Cagiva's 350 trials bike is the latest thing on the Mick Walker stand, as well as a 250 enduro version of the moto crosser.


Aprilia have a lot of novelties, including this watercooled 125 cc bike which may make the show.

Motor Cycle News Bretton Court, Bretton, Peterborough Now in a confusing Red and yellow colour, the old blue 'un is far away the largest selling motorcycle paper, and is offering a special deal on subscriptions as well as having Sammy Miller's classic Ariel on the stand. Might even tempt Ralph Venables to show up.

Belstaff FNT. Ltd. Caroling Street, Longton, Stoke-on-Trent. Belstaff have always been big in the weatherproofing business, and in addition to their range of practical off-road clothing, they also have the popular range of Metzler tyres.

Honda (UK) Ltd Power Road, Chiswick, London W4 You still won't be able to find a Graham Noyce replica open class moto crosser, but with one World and several British Championships under their belt, Big H is making a big push.

Strong challengers in the schoolboy class must be the new CR80 and CR125s, supplemented by a re-vamped CR250 for the experts. The CR80 is the long-awaited replacement for the popular XR four-stroke mini-bike for serious competition, and fills an important gap in Honda's range.

Equally as sensational has got to be the XR200, shown for the first time in Europe, and to be available in Britain to complete Honda's four-stroke enduro range. The overhead cam motor is exceptionally light, and has a six speed gearbox.

Mick Walker (HD) Ltd 236 Norwich Road, Wisbech, Cambs. The former Harley-Davidson Italian factory has already turned heads with its attractive 250 moto cross, and enduro and trials Cagivas are now in limited production. Mick Walker prides himself on his spares back-up service, and in addition to Cagiva, also has the Testi range of schoolboy-size machines.

John Rudge is currently gearing up for full production of mini-bikes at his British factory, while the Tecnomoto range covers a good spread of machines both for fun and for serious competition.

In addition he'll be showing the PJ1 nylon jets for Mikuni carbs, and Tonelli protective race shirts for adults and schoolboys.

Wasp Motorcycles South Newton, Salisbury, Wiltshire The most expensive production machine at the show is Robin Rhind-Tutt's sidecar moto cross outfit. Complete with Norton engine, this all-British competition combination will set you back around £2,500. Robbie will also have a grass track outfit, tuning parts and other accessories for chairs.

AJS of Andover Goodworth Clatford, Andover, Hants Fluff Brown has his new Red Devil moto cross bike with a completely new frame to go with the colour scheme. As well as an AJS enduro bike, a couple of novelties on the stand will include a 500 Honda chassis conversion.

Antig Engineering 20-22a St James Street, Gloucester Tig Perry has his special grass track and speedway machines for adults and schoolboys, with a variety of power units from Minarelli cadet class ones to full blown 4-valve Weslakes. Other accessories, including ignition boxes, are also on the stand.

Mitsui Machinery Sales Oakcroft Road, Chessington, Surrey With a bid for Britain's number two moto cross rider (not to mention the world's), Yamaha are mounting a big push as evidenced by their sheer range of models, covering all capacities, in every class of competition.

Obviously they're staking a lot on the big 465 Mikkola Replica monoshock, but there's a back up all along the line to the cadets.

The YZ125s and 80s look firm favourites among the juniors, and the full trials range is still going strong.

Raising eyebrows could be the appearance of the IT range of enduro bikes, with 175, 250 400 cc models coming in on limited supply.

For the thumper fan, the HL500 is there too.

With just a couple of basic bikes, Fantic have an amazing selection of models suitable for the small classes in trials and enduro, both for kids and grown-ups. The bikes are backed up with a smart new range of clothing and accessories from Italy.

One of the show-stoppers has got to be the 420 Uni-trak. From GP bike to production model in one year is a real Japanese wonder, and with 250 and 125 cc single shock moto crossers completing the team the green meanies have arrived with a vengence. Another Uni-trak for enduros, a four stroke freaks dream, and a new-look 80 for the kids will keep Alec Wright beaming this week.

Swedish steel shines on the Brian Leask stand with the new range of GP Huskies, and yet another world championship to paint on the side of Brian's van. The Carlqvist replica 250 and 390 moto cross bikes also have 125 and enduro stablemates, and of course there's the range of Ohlins units for all models. Scott goggles and face masks complete the display.

Nearest to the bar, a massive range of Suzuki's is fielded by the Beamish group. The up-dated RM moto cross line up from schoolboys to seniors takes pride of place, but the very successful PE enduro range is re-launched with a big brother which will turn many heads. Top tailor for the dirt bike freak in Britain, Len Thwaites knows all about the right sort of clothing when it comes to trials, moto cross and enduro. He'll be showing the firm's full range of clobber, which will be for sale downstairs on the Fowlers stand.

Dave Fennell has a complete range of the Italian factory's tiddlers for moto cross and enduro, as well as clothing and accessories. He also hopes to unveil an impressive new GP calibre 125 MX.

Beta have a range of bikes for moto cross and enduro from Italy, with their 125 and 250 models as part of an expanding production from this factory.

If you missed Bill Hawker last year hawking Trelleborg tyres, you'll find him this year with Izumi chain, used of course by most of the top aces, as well as Stadium MX accessories and the Hopkirk race face helmet. Tran Am supply most good dealers.

A new name to this country, and yet to be tested on the tracks, Aprilla have some smart ideas in their off-road range which uses the Hiro motors for both moto cross and enduro.

The mark of any good factory is not sitting back on its laurels. And with far and away top moto cross sales over past seasons Maico have had more comfortable seats than most. Yet they've plunged in with an all-new look, and almost oriental appearance for the West German stalwart. The signs are Badger's blitzkreig will continue. If he doesn't convince you to buy a bike, his range of M. Robert clothing and accessories for all makes may turn your head. That's just across the way.

No shortage of variety in Alan Clews range. The Bolton boomers are still going strong, with a limited works replica edition of the four valver, and a mean-looking enduro conversion.

125 and 250 cc Hiro-engined moto crossers complete the sophisticated selection for seniors and schoolboys.

With King Rat back in command, Montessa look set for another successful trials season with the new Cota, But at the same time, with a new big class moto cross bike, and on-form Pete Mathia at the helm, the whole range looks good.

A new 125 for the schoolboys, and revamped H6 enduros complete the Spanish show

from Sandifords.

Also at the Show:

The ACU

The *Auto Cycle Union* of course is the governing body of the sport, covering licences, dealing with the British Championships, Grand Prix and International events. Ken Blampied, familiar to Dodington Park goers, will be in charge, and the *Youth Division* will be represented.

The AMCA

The AMCA is the amateur body for off-road sport with an increasing involvement in the regions. Don Green will be on the stand explaining exactly how the association works for club members.

See them, and tell them what you think about the state and the future of British moto cross, and we'll see if we can put our joint ideas into action.




