The Superman They Want To Beat

JOEL ROBERT is the man in the hot seat today. A legend at 27, this laughing cavalier from Belgium has more world championship victories than any moto cross champion in history.

When these lines were written — before the Finnish and Swedish rounds — Joel needed only one more win in the 250 cc series to achieve an all-time record of five world titles.

His record in the British Grand Prix — he has three wins from his four appearances in A.-C.U. promoted world title rounds — make him the target of a galaxy of talent from eleven different countries.

Joel is the superman to beat. But who can do it?

Until the East German contest — where Joel realised the distinction of winning grand prix battles in every European country in which they have been staged — Sylvain Geboers was the only rider who had beaten the maestro this season.

Two years younger than his countryman and fellow Suzuki works rider, slim Sylvain beat beefy Joel in Holland. It was his first win in the series since he underwent a knee operation three months previously but Joel was handicapped by an aching back.

Despite his formidable physique and fantastic skill, Joel is not immune to the stresses of one of the world's toughest sports. In 1968, when the British round was first held at Dodington, he sprained a leg during practice and Sylvain stormed to victory.

Similarly, the Japanese superbikes they share with Swedish veteran Olle Pettersson are not infallible. In Poland, Joel was sidelined by suspension trouble and his gearbox failed in West Germany.


On both occasions, a Finnish rider snatched the opportunity to score maximum points. Heikki Mikkola, 25, is the flying Finn who gives cold shivers to the Suzuki camp.

A hard man with a works Husqvarna which is still on the secret list, Mikkola is the most feared of a rugged bunch of Scandinavians which include Kalevi Vehkonen, the snowmobile racing champion who licked the moto cross stars in Poland.

What of the British side? Bryan Wade and Malcolm Davis, two young businessmen who have shared the British 250 Championship for the past four years, are the most likely contenders for a home win.

Both from Gloucestershire, they live a few miles from the circuit, but although they are the only Britons with world cham-

pionship points, neither has yet shone in a twelve-round contest in which the seven best performances count.

The sad fact that no Briton has won at home since Dave Bickers stunned us at Glastonbury in 1965 should stimulate tremendous rivalry among the nine lads who shoulder the responsibility of trying to raise the Union Jack from the doldrums.

Andy Roberton, 23, is rapidly getting back in the groove with a Husky following the disbanding of the BSA team and Bryan Goss races the only Maico among ten different makes of machine.

Vic Eastwood, the AJS development engineer, has two 500 cc grands prix wins to his name. During a courageous comeback from injury he has proved that he has lost none of his confidence but an all-British win is probably too much to hope for.

Dick Clayton will no doubt do his best to confound the pundits on a Greeves specially fettled for the Bristol club's great occasion and Arthur Browning, who has been gaining experience over the Channel since he parted with Greeves, will be our only genuine privateer.

Technically, in a line-up of 32 two-strokes, the most exciting will be the prototype Yamaha ridden by development wizard Torsten Hallman, the Swede who won four world titles for Husqvarna.

No longer regarded as a serious threat, Hallman amazed the world by scoring in Holland and this will be the first time Yamaha have contested a British classic. Two Japanese rode in supporting events last year.

With Hakan Andersson and Uno Palm well up the title table, six Swedish riders can be expected to include in team tactics but do not underestimate the men from behind the Iron Curtain on CZs.

In Switzerland earlier this year, I watched a Russian catch and overtake the mighty Joel. The Soviet hero, whose glory was stopped by a broken chain, was Gennadi Moiseev but his countryman Vladimir Kavinov was a brilliant third.

With top officials of the Russian federation coming over to watch them, the four Russians will be out to eclipse their friends from Czechoslovakia, of whom Miroslav Halm and newcomer Jaroslav Falta are probably the best.

When the only folding steel starting grid in Britain releases a great international field, I expect to see Joel storm off in a cloud of dust but, who knows, it might even rain!





In all Grand Prix points are awarded in each of the two races — 1 point for the first, 2 points for the second, 3 points for the third, etc. The points gained in each race will be totalled and the winner of the Grand Prix will be the rider with the smallest number of points. In the event of two or more riders having the same total of points, then the rider who has completed the most laps will be adjudged the winner. Should there still be a tie the rider who had made the best time will be adjudged the winner. The winner on "overall classification" scores 15 Championship points; second, 12 points; third, 10 points; fourth, 8 points; fifth, 6 points; sixth, 5 points; seventh, 4 points; eighth, 3 points; ninth, 2 points; and tenth, 1 point.


