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THAMESDOWN 500 INTERNATIONAL PREVIEW

Foxhill Moto Park has come a long way since the Thamesdown club began racing here just over six years ago. Mother nature has smiled sweetly on this corner of Whiltshire, in creating a natural amphitheatre to give spectators probably one of the best views at any Motocross venue in this country, or even the World.

Millions of years before man, let alone off-road machinery, was ever thought of, the Ice Age left behind a legacy in the form of this demanding and competitive circuit to exact the best of the sport's leading stars.

Conditions today will have little, or no, resemblance to this year's curtain - raiser held in February. A large crowd emerged from the winter thaw to see Jem Whatley triumph in the sticky, strength sapping conditions to win all three races and claim outright victory in the Foxhill Grand National.

Whilst Whatley eased his way around the meandering chalk valley circuit, the mud proved to be no respecter of reputations, causing many of the leading names in British Motocross untold grief.

Mounted on the Action Workshops Kawasaki, Whatley would dearly love to add a second win today.

Trying to prevent him from getting only to the victor's rostrum will be a host of the country's leading riders. Mervyn Anstie has only to travel just up the road from his Ludgershall home to reach the circuit. Now mounted on the Team ES Bikesport 500, he has assembled the most formidable backroom crew ever for a privateer to take on the mighty factory teams.

Anstie is the first ever 'scientifically monitored' rider in the history of Motocross with a team from St. Mary's College in London checking his progress throughout the British and World 500cc championship campaigns. The roar of his legions of supporters will ensure that the Berkshire-born holeshot ace, on the distintive black and orange machine, will not be lacking any encouragement

Anstie proved to be a master of the Foxhill circuit with a decisive win in last season's final round of the British Open Championship and will be out to demonstrate the same aggressive riding style, that brought him that victory, today.


Despite losing his World Crown last season, Dave Thorpe still remains the darling of Britain's motocross fans. Three prestigious 'number one' plates have brought the 29 year old Sunningdale rider fame and fortune. Every inch the competitor, Thorpe would have made it to the top in whatever sport he chose. Whilst in his teens, he proved himself equally at home on a football pitch as he did a motocross circuit and could easily have become a soccer professional. His presence guarantees an increase in the attendance wherever he appears. If motocross attracted it's fair share of column inches in the National Press, Thorpe would be even more of a household name than he is already.

Kurt Nicoll, winner of the British 'Open' championship for the past three seasons is the in-form rider the others will have to watch today. The KTM mounted East Anglian ace won this year's opening Grand Prix in Switzerland and heads the chase for the World Crown vacated by Eric Geboers, who has since retired from active service in the saddle. Last season's runner-up, he heads a quality field that will ensure that his claim to the vacant crown is tested to the full. Paul Malin, Kawasaki's teenage sensation who is fast making an impact on the Grand Prix scene in only his second season amongst the elite, is another British rider strongly fancied today.

Heading the list of continental riders, to challenge the British riders is Belgian veteran Georges Jobe. The former World Champion has discovered a new lease of life this season and the prospect of him acquiring another 'number one' plate cannot be discounted. Another Belgian Marc Velkeneers, the Dutch trio of Kees van De Ven, Eric Van Klinken and William Wopken, Honda mounted Italian Giovanni Gavatorta, French Super cross kingpin Olivier Perrin and Denmark's Soren Mortensen are the other overseas riders attracted to the West Country, no doubt due to Foxhill gaining FIM status. With every possibility that a future British 500 Grand Prix will be staged here, the opportunity to test the circuit was too good to miss.

With five of the twelve rounds completed in this year's quest for the World Title, today's meeting provides the leading riders with the opportunity to continue racing, against the sternest opposition on offer, during a weekend when no championship event is being staged. So with a race order that reads like a who's who of Motocross, there is no doubt that today's Thamesdown 500 International will provide a meeting to savour and remember, and keep the sport's leading practitioners in peak condition for next weekend's Dutch Grand Prix at Norg.

THE HAYNES FOUR STROKE MOTOCROSS CHAMPIONSHIP

Now in it's fifteenth year of sponsorship, the Haynes Four Stroke Motocross Championship has become a well established event in the yearly sporting calendar, with a following all it's own. It was not until late

1967 that the need for a Four-Stroke Championship became apparent, due to the fact that the sport had become totally dominated by two-strokes and was in danger of losing it's spectator appeal as a consequence. As by that time the big British "banger" had all but disappeared from the scene, several motor-cycle clubs based in Southern England got together during December 1967 for a discussion about the future of Motocross. As a result of that meeting it became obvious that there was sufficient support to launch a Four Stroke Championship the following year.

The Championship was sponsored initially by public subscription, with help from a weekly motor-cycle newspaper, and at one time by a former leading Scrambles rider. Then referred to as the Four Stroke Scrambles Championship it continued to be supported in this fashion until 1977, by which time there was insufficient money to keep it going. A chance 'phone call made by Ralph Venables to the Haynes Publishing Group resulted in a rescue operation, with the promise of sufficient financial support to keep the Championship going that year. Renamed the Haynes Four Stroke Motocross Championship, and with continuing financial support, the Championship rapidly grew in status to reach the high level with which it is regarded today. Increased spectator support and ample coverage in motor-cycling magazines and newspapers, as well as in local papers, has made the Championship one of the most prestigous in the British Motocross calendar.

So far, only two riders have competed the hat-trick by winning the Championship three times in succession - Dave Tomasik riding a Cecil K.T.M. and Steve How riding a Pro-Circuit Husqvarna. Ken Hanson also won it three times, but not consecutively. Wayne Le Marquand has won it twice and Cornishman Robbie Blake had the distinction of recording the first Championship win under Haynes sponsorship in 1977.

The end of the 1990 season brought to light a new Champion - Lee King riding a Husaberg. Lee won by the greatest margin of marks ever and it will be interesting to see if he will be able to retain his Championship crown for the second year in succession in the face of anticipated fierce opposition from Steve How, who regained form at the end of last season riding a works CCM.

Perhaps surprisingly, the Championship has been won only once by a machine of Japanese manufacture.



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
