



MOTO-CROSS GRAND PRIX OF GREAT BRITAIN

This is the first world 250 c.c. Moto-Cross Championship ever to be staged in Britain so let's kick-off with congratulations to the Tor Motor Cycle and Car Club, the organisers of today's meeting, at being given this opportunity to present the showpiece of light-weight scrambling.

Fifteen countries—two more than took part in the European Championship last year—are competing in the current world series and a record entry of 12 countries are represented here today, although, naturally, the British are numerically stronger.

Newcomers to the world championship are Spain and Russia. Both countries have produced several first-class riders and a glance at the up-to-date championship table shows they are already sharing the points "gold". The Russians, in particular, improve with every outing. They have earned considerable praise from riders of all nationalities and, knowing the Russians' policy of going for the big prizes—no matter whether they are in industry, politics or sport—I'm quite prepared to see a Russian challenging for the title next year.

Meanwhile, Britain, under the BSA banner and in the capable hands of Birmingham wizard Jeff Smith and his fellow works rider, Yorkshireman Arthur Lampkin, is getting on with the business of bringing home this year's crown.

After reading, week by week, their exploits against the world's top men in a dozen different countries, at last we are now able to see for ourselves the odds they battle against. And it is also well to remember that apart from riding in these bitterly contested races over courses that vary from deep mud in spring and autumn to the rockhard surfaces in summer, there's something like 30,000 miles of travelling between meetings.

And even for today's "home" event they haven't escaped. They've had a 1,200-mile drive back from Italy: and in the few weeks prior to that the route has been Czechoslovakia-Poland-Holland-Luxembourg-Finland-West Germany, making ten weeks today of continuous journeying. It's certainly tough at the top.

Next year, all being well, the series will be run on a group basis. The championship is to be split into three parts with a six-week interval between each. This will enable riders to get home (for a rest?) and do essential work on their machines. Groupings will bring together countries with adjoining borders and in this way it is expected that travelling will be cut by half... to a mere 13,000 miles!

What to look for today? Well, for a start I'm taking a good look at that potential world-beater from Sweden, Torsten Hallman. And his firebrand Huskie, of course. He's one of the "greats" in this class of scrambling and although he doesn't get full works support, so far he has not missed a round, including the trips behind the Iron Curtain.

Also on the foreign front there's Aarno Erola, Finland's outstanding rider both on home circuits and abroad. But Aarno says that next year the man to watch for (the way he put it, we won't be able to miss him!) is Pentti Kalteva, a young man still doing his military service but who has already won the Finnish championship. Yes, he even beat Erola.

There's always plenty to see among the overseas machines, but take a look at the British Manufacturers' latest scrambles outfits. There are quite a few experimental bikes being used this time and if the Rickman brothers' new Metisse is within sight . . . now there's a mount to challenge the world!

This meeting marks a milestone in British scrambles history. The Daily Herald, in offering sponsorship to yet another world event is pleased to be a part of it. Tomorrow's Herald will carry a full report and complete results of both the world event and supporting races.

250 c.c. WORLD MOTO CROSS CHAMPIONSHIP, 1962. This year the series has been upgraded to World Championship status and 15 Grand Prix meetings have been selected for the Championship—riders' best 8 performances to count. The meetings are—

26th February, Spain (winner A. J. Lampkin); 8th April, Switzerland (J. V. Smith); 29th April, Belgium (A. J. Lampkin); 6th May, France (T. Hallman); 20th May, Czechoslovakia (V. Valek); 27th May, Poland (J. V. Smith); 3rd June, Holland (J. V. Smith); 10th June, Luxembourg (T. Hallman); 17th June, Finland (A. Erola); 24th June, U.S.S.R. (T. Hallman); 1st July, W. Germany; 8th July, Italy; 15th July, Great Britain; 2nd September, Sweden; 9th September, E. Germany.

In all Grands Prix points are awarded in each of the two races—I point for the first, 2 points for the second, 3 points for the third, etc. The points gained in each race will be totalled and the winner of the Grand Prix will be the rider with the smallest number of points. In the event of two or more riders having the same total of points, then the rider who has completed the most laps will be adjudged the winner. Should there still be a tie the rider who had made the best time will be adjudged the winner. The winner on "overall classification" scores 8 Championship points, second - 6 points, third - 4 points, fourth 3 points, fifth - 2 points, and sixth - I point.
