The 1963 Moto-Cross Grand

For the first time in nearly seven years Britain is again seriously in the hunt for world 500cc moto-cross honours. It has been a long, slow uphill grind for our scramblers, the majority of them privateers and spearheaded by a few—never more than half a dozen—tough factory-supported riders whose chances of blasting apart the strangle-hold of Swedish supremacy has been so remote we can have only admiration for their determination and guts at sticking at such a profitless task.

But now it's different. BSA have stepped into the battle with both feet. Although they have always had a rider or two in each series since Johnny Draper won the title for Britain and the Birmingham factory back in 1955—only one other Englishman, Les Archer, has won it since and that the following year—they are now making an all-out attempt to topple the Swedes.

In addition to John Burton, who finished sixth in the series last year, both Jeff Smith and Arthur Lampkin have been switched from contesting the 250 world championship, to full-time duty among the bigger capacities. Jeff Smith, like the great Dave Curtis, (now retired), has repeatedly beaten the Swedes on circuits all over the Continent, and no victory was more heartening or inspiring than in Denmark in May when before a record crowd at Randers and on a dusty course with a typical "Hawkstone hill" he twice inflicted a good old-fashioned British beating on the reigning world champion Rolf Tibblin and former champions Sten Lundin and Bill Nilsson.

Today's meeting is the ninth in the 13-meeting series and it's a neckand-neck struggle with every point gained a vital one. Scoring in the Grand Prix is unchanged, that is, the winner after two races collects 8 points; second, 6 points; third, 4 points; fourth, 3 points; fifth, 2 points and the sixth, one point. The outright winner of today's Grand Prix also receives the silver Daily Herald Trophy, which he holds for one year, and a silver replica.

The winner last year, both here and of the world series, was, of course, Rolf Tibblin, and I cannot recall ever witnessing such wild scenes of popularity that followed his victory. No "pop" idol was


more effectively mobbed. Certainly no British rider—not even the brilliant Dave Curtis—ever received greater adulation.




FANFARES—NATIONAL ANTHEMS—INCIDENTAL MUSIC

Following today's ninth round, the remaining venues are: Belgium (August 4th), Luxembourg (August 11th), West Germany (Sept. 1st), East Germany (Sept. 8th).



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


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


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
