




THE 1964 **MOTO-CROSS DES NATIONS**

The Moto-Cross des Nations is one of the really great motorcycle sporting events of the year. It is the senior scrambles competition and is in every way a world team championship being open to all the 41 member countries of the Federation Internationale Motocycliste.

This is the eighteenth meeting in the series which began in Holland in 1947 (won, incidentally, by Britain) and since then it has travelled to most Continental countries. It has been held in Belgium and Sweden four times, in Holland three times, once each in Denmark,

France and Switzerland and three times in Britain.

The three visits to Britain-in 1949, 1952 and 1957-were all staged at Brands Hatch on the then highly spectacular and exciting course which, alas, has been swallowed up by the ever-growing international road race circuit. Hawkstone Park has been the home of the British round of the 500 cc world individual moto-cross championship for many years and with regulations prohibiting any country staging both the world individual and team championship. in the same year, it was an automatic choice for this "plum" fixture.

Today's event brings together the elite in world 500 cc scrambling. Each competing country nominates its five best riders offering enthusiasts a far better chance of weighing up a country's strength than in the normal Grand Prix when, all too often, we see only one or two

national representatives and then not always the top men.

The Moto Cross des Nations will consist of two separate races. each of 15 laps of Hawkstone's famous 11-mile circuit—a total of just under 19 miles for each race. Teams will compete in each race with not less than three and not more than five riders and all riders.

are allowed to compete in the two races.

The winner of each race will be awarded one point, the second gets two points and so on to the last rider to cross the finishing line. The winning team will be that whose best THREE riders obtain the lowest aggregate number of points in the two races. If there is a tie on points, placings will be decided by the team (of three riders) completing most laps. If they have an equal number of laps it will be decided by the lowest aggregate time for the two races.

Britain has won the title eleven times and on only one occasion have they failed to get either first or second. And this despite the fact that in recent years the Swedes have dominated both 500 cc and 250 cc classes of individual moto-cross championships. But team racing has always been a strong asset of British sportsmen and we have been trebly fortunate in having the skill and experience of three

brilliant team managers in first, Harold Taylor who for many, many years has set the standard, not only in Britain but throughout the moto-cross world, for sportsmanship and understanding and whose shrewd coaching brought Britain many a victory when little more than opportunity existed, then Ron Baines, the brilliant young Southern Centre official, and to today Peter Wigg, who last year achieved the "impossible" by taking the team to victory over the Swedes on their home territory at Knutsdorp. True the Swedes were without both Rolf Tibblin, the reigning world champion, and Bill Nilssen, a former champion, but before the event Britain was still booked for

a beating.

Ron Baines was in charge when, to my thinking, Britain pulled off the greatest and most remarkable victory of all time. It was at Cassel, northern France, in 1960. Days of torrential rain turned the hillside course into a mud bath. It was the deepest, stickiest, axledeep mud ever encountered on any Continental circuit. After two gruelling hours the course looked like a battlefield. Hills were unclimbable-except to the British-the series of loops on a 60 degree hillside would have frightened off a trials genius, and men and machines were scattered, to stick where they fell, over a mile of sheer misery. Yet the British boys kept going. And they were the only riders to finish! The team then: Jeff Smith, Dave Curtis, Don Rickman, John Burton, Les Archer and, of course, Ron Baines. What a wonderful team !

Two of that team, Jeff Smith and Don Rickman, are, of course, riding for Britain again today. In fact they have been regular members since 1959. Don's elder brother, Derek, and Arthur Lampkin have also made several appearances in British "green," both playing big parts in last year's great triumph in Sweden. Newcomer to the side is Vic Eastwood, the Matchless works rider from Bexleyheath, Kent, who is no stranger to Hawkstone Park. He takes the place of John Burton, now riding as a privateer, and only just

beginning to find his best form after two serious injuries.

The overall entry for today's fixture is again first class. It looks as though the Swedes will be Britain's No. 1 target, but there are many greatly improved youngsters in the other teams particularly in the Dutch, Belgian and French line-ups, on a very sporting circuit like Hawkstone where the terrain switches from hard, rocky going to the deep sand that so suits the Dutchmen, anything can happen.


Of one thing I am certain. You will enjoy top bracket riding and racing throughout the meeting and the performances of this group of really grand riders will give everyone something to talk

about for weeks to come.

Finally, we on the Daily Herald have enjoyed every moment of the sponsorship of these exciting motor-cycle sporting events and we are indeed proud and grateful to have made so many friends among the members of the Auto-Cycle Union, of the many organising clubs with whom we have been associated and, in particular, with today's hosts, the Salop Motor Club.


