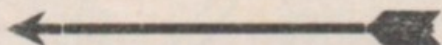

## BRYAN SEERY WRITES

What we'd really like is a good win tonight, and a good draw tomorrow.

For tonight is Knock-Out Cup night—and the last match of the 1967 Second Round. And tonight's winners will be joining in the last eight Swindon who got through over a month ago; West Ham, who scored the biggest K.O. Cup victory so far this season over Glasgow; Poole, who put out last year's Cup winners, Halifax; Edinburgh, who disposed of Wolverhampton and thus ensured that the Midlands would go at least another season without ever riding a home match in this competition; Coventry, who eked out the tightest 2nd round victory so far, by 4 points, over Newcastle; and Hackney. And whoever is declared the winner of the King's Lynn v. Belle Vue tie which is open to dispute—the meeting having been finished without the benefit of the referee after that gentleman had been asked to relinquish his post—by both teams—after a heat 14 incident.

With the current League table up to the time of writing showing Newport in third place and the Archers in fourth, tonight's match is going to be no pushover—for either side. Newport have reached this second round without undue exertion, having drawn a bye in the first. Long Eaton, however, had to negotiate the hurdle of Cradley Heath—on the Heathens track—to get here, recording, in the process, the only away win the competition has produced so far this season.

And tomorrow, the draw will be made for Round Three—and the Archers have every intention of being in it! And the next one, too, given a fair break.

For the possibility of progress must be there, this year as never before. As a glance at the current League table indicates. Swindon—mid-club in the table—are through to the last eight of the cup. And of the other seven quarter-finalists **three** are at present showing in the **top** half of the table, while **four** are in the **bottom**.

In each of the two previous British League seasons, the team winning the League has taken the K.O. Cup as well. West Ham in 1965; Halifax in 1966.

The chances of a triple double being completed this year must, mathematically speaking, be considered remote. But it could happen. For the ordinary, conventional League table can often be misleading, taking no account of number of matches ridden, or their home and away split. For example, while Belle Vue are shown down in the depths, with only 10 points from 19 matches, no fewer than 13 of those matches have been ridden away from home.

No, more revealing of the true state of affairs, to my mind, is the plus-minus method—crediting a team with plus one for every match point gained away from home, and debiting minus one for every match point lost at home. Thus, under this method, the Archers would be considered to be breaking even, having lost two home match points in the draws with Wolverhampton and West Ham, and cancelling these out with the win at Belle Vue.

When the entire League is arranged under this scheme the table shapes up like this. **Plus 4**—Swindon, West Ham; **plus 3**—Newport, Wolverhampton, Poole, Sheffield, Halifax; **plus 2**—Newcastle, Coventry; **plus 1**—Wimbledon, Hackney; **even**—Long Eaton; **minus 1**—Oxford; **minus 2**—Glasgow, Belle Vue, Edinburgh; **minus 4**—Exeter; **minus 8**—King's Lynn; **minus 10**—Cradley.

Which shows that of the seven quarter-finalists already through, only two have a minus rating. So the 1967 Knock-Out Cup isn't going to be won so easily—by anybody—after all.
