The George Reynolds Memorial Trophy, to be held for one year with memento for retention, will be awarded to the driver making the fastest lap of the day.

The Dennis Lashmar Challenge Trophy, to be held for one year with memento for retention, will be awarded to the driver making the fastest lap of the day in the three-wheeler category.

Rickard, Esq.), to be held for one year with memento for retention, will be awarded for the best performance by a B.M.C.R.C. member who is a private owner not in receipt of Manufacturer's or other Trade support. On this and the following pages are photographs and details of some of the riders who are taking part in today's events. Compiled from the files of Motor Cycling, they will serve as a guide to some of the outstanding riders who will battle it out at this famous BMCRC meeting.

JOHNNY GRACE

A native of Gibraltar and 37-years-old, Johnny Grace has been racing since 1951. He made his name on Nortons in the big classes but he is better known on the two-stroke Bultacos on which he has done a great deal of the factory development work.









FLORIAN CAMATHIAS

Winner of the Mellano Trophy at last year's Hutchinson 100 meeting Switzerland's Florian Camathias has narrowly missed the Sidecar World Championship several times. Aged 38, he tried solo racing in 1954 before turning his hand to three-wheels.



Just returned from a winter's racing in South Africa 22-year-old Phil Read, of Luton, hopes this year to pilot the "desmo" Ducati 350 cc twin owned and tuned by John Surtees. Winner of last year's Junior TT, Phil had his first big Isle of Man success in 1960 when he won the Senior MGP at 95.38 mph.

JACKIE BEETON

Jackie Beeton, a 47-year-old motor engineer, first raced at Cadwell Park in 1934 mounted on a Scott outfit. Last year he finished fourth in the A-CU Sidecar Star competition with his RMW outfit



EDGAR STRUB

A 45-year-old Swiss garage-owner Edgar Strub started racing in 1949, and is still one of the world's finest sidecar exponents. Last year he finished third in the World Championship. This season he will continue to ride his BWM.



Sensation of sidecar racing on British short-circuits last year was Chris Vincent with his special BSA. The combination of Vincent's driving, a "kneeler" frame and a highly tuned BSA twin engine made many of the established stars fade into the background. FRITZ SCHEIDEGGER

In the past three years this Swiss sidecar ace from Liangenthal has never finished bewer than third in the World Championship series. He was third in 1959, second in 1960 and second again in 1961. With his German BMW outfit he won the French and Belgian Grands Prix last year.




PIP HARRIS


MAX DEUBEL




MIKE HAILWOOD

ride MVs this year.




DEREK MINTER


First man to lap the Isle of Man circuit at over 100 mph on a single cylinder machine—in 1960—Derek Minter is also a short circuit wizard. Now 29, this Canterbury ace started racing in 1953. This year he may ride on Junior and Senior Mortons, a 250 Honda and a 125 EMC.

Canterbury star, Derek Minter, may well be seen this season riding a British EMC two-stroke. Here he is testing the new model at Brands Hatch recently.

The Spanish Bultaco 125 cc racer proved that it was the fastest orthodox two-stroke in racing today. In the hands of such riders as Dan Shorey and Johnny Grace they demonstrated their speed and reliability on circuits everywhere. This year the "works" machines have had their stopping power improved by the fitting of an Oldani front brake.

One of the 250 cc Benelli racers on the bench being prepared for an outing last year. These ultra-powerful single-cylinder models will be raced in England this year thanks to Shrewsbury dealer Fron Purslow who will be sponsoring some well-known riders on them. Among those mentioned as possible pilots are John Hartle, Derek Minter and Mike Hailwood.









BOB McINTYRE

One of the greatest riders in the world today, 34-year-old Bob McIntyre scored a TT double in 1957 winning the Junior and Senior on Gilera "fours". In the 500 cc race, he also became the first man ever to lap the Isle of Man circuit at over 100 mph. And last year he all but notched a TT "ton" on a 250 cc Honda.



ALAN SHEPHERD

A member of the MZ team last year, 27-year-old Alan Shepherd put up his most sensational performance on an AJS in 1960 when he shocked the MV team by dicing with John Surtees in the Ulster Grand Prix and notching a lap record before he was put out by mechanical failure.

BILL BODDICE

One of this country's leading sidecar racers Bill Boddice has been racing on two or three-wheels since 1933. His first sidecar success was at Ansty in 1949. A 48-year-old Birmingham electrical engineer, he will be using a special "kneeler" outfit this year.



PADDY DRIVER

South African Paddy Driver began racing in 1953. Now 28 he rode for the Japanese Suzuki works team last year but did not meet with much success. Nearly all of his best performances have been put up on his Junior and Senior Manx Nortons.

ALASTAIR KING

Bob McIntyre's team-mate, 36-year-old Alastair King has had a lot of bad luck in recent years. After recovering from a bad accident at Scarborough in 1959, he made a fighting come-back last year finishing fourth in the Senior TT, but spilled again during one of the last meetings of the season.

TONY GODFREY

Winner of the first-ever American Grand Prix (1961) Tony Godfrey 31-year-old Southampton draughtsman is one of today's foremost racing stars. Last year he finished seventh in the 125 cc TT and sixth in the Senior.









TOM THORP

The 30th Hutchinson 100

by Guy Tremlett

Today's Hutch is the 30th of the series. It is a fact that this event is the oldest motor cycle race currently held on the mainland of Great Britain. Naturally over the years the event has changed; after all what has not? But one thing, or rather two, have remained constant. First all the Hutches have been organised by B.M.C.R.C. and, second, the magnificent Mellano Trophy has always been the major award.

The first Hutch was run on Saturday. 16th May, 1925 at Brooklands track and was over 100 miles on the Outer Circuit: that is to say, it was a flat-out blind. As was usual with Bemsee races at that track. an individual handicap system was employed, riders starting off according to their handicap allowance. There were 54 entries, 42 starters and 18 finishers. Food for thought, eh? The winner was Frank Longman on one of Watson's 989 c.c. Harley Davidsons who averaged 89.86 m..ph. for the 37 laps. Second was P. M. Walters on a 344 c.c. Zenith-J.A.P. and third H. J. Knight on a 976 c.c. Zenith-J.A.P. So successful was the race that it was repeated the following year and thereafter until 1938. The 1939 race had to be cancelled because of the Second World War. In 1926 a 250 won it-Charlie Barrow riding a 246 c.c. Royal

Enfield-J.A.P.—and in '27 it was a 350's turn; the late Harold Willis with one of the first o.h.c. KTT Velocettes. Willis averaged 86.39 m.p.h., a speed comfortably beaten the next year when two middle markers, Percy Brewster (495 c.c. Matchless) and Freddie Hicks (348 c.c. Velocette), got through to the front in that order and the winner averaged 93.52 m.p.h. 350's got in most of the winning as a Sunbeam won in 1929 and a Velocette again the next two years. Oddly enough Hirst Mitchell and "Spug" Muir. the '30 and '31 victors, both averaged the same speed—94.68 m.p.h. In 1932 a 500 won, from scratch too—the only time it was done-Ben Bickell with the Bickell-J.A.P. at 99.61 m.p.h. This year, too, saw Jack Williams, the present A.M.C. race "gaffer", in third place on a 499 c.c. Douglas. In 1933 Les Archer got his 348 c.c. Velocette through to first place at 101.61 m.p.h. This proved to be the only time it was ever done at the "ton". though Bickell did 101.30 to finish second the same year (again from scratch) and Jock West was second in 1935 on his 493 c.c. Triumph at 100.01 m.p.h. The last two Brooklands Hutches fell to Bob Lunn (348 c.c. Velocette) and Maurice Cann (248 c.c. Excelsior). Bob Lunn is mine host of a pub in Hertfordshire today and still a member of the Club.

After the War B.M.C.R.C. was without a home and for 1947 and 1948 was indebted to the Air Ministry and the Lincoln club for the use of Dunholme Lodge airfield near the latter city. The meetings were marathons of their kind and huge fields were let loose. The

circuit measured a little over 3 miles and 100, yes 100, riders took it at one and the same time. There were no serious crashes and the racing was fine. The works Nortons and the A.J.S. graced the events, not to mention, the Cann Guzzis the Nigel Spring/R. S. Wilkins semi-factory Velocettes of Bob Foster and Fred Frith and hordes of others. The A.J.S. 500 c.c. twins proved the fastest machines there, but the Mellano Trophy, which now had to be given on a sealed handicap basis over the whole meeting of short-ish races. was won by young Les Archer riding a 246 c.c. E.M.C. A 250 won it again in 1948, Len Bayliss from Coventry on his Ellbee Special.

With the move to Silverstone in 1949 things became a little more settled and the Mellano Trophy was either awarded on a sealed handicap or to the winner of a specific race. Two of these latter, in 1949 and 1950, actually had solos and sidecars running together! By now, of course, sought after though the Mellano Trophy was, the scratch races were of equal importance. Unfortunately for the Club the meeting was never much of a success financially and it was bedevilled by some really beastly weather too. 1950 was a continuous downpour and the principal 500 race was won by Willie Ryan on his J.A.P. powered W.R. Special. The best lap on that dreadful day went to the late Dennis Lashmar on a 998 c.c. Vincent-H.R.D.; one of the most sensational sights ever seen on this circuit! 1952 was wet too, though not to the extent that it worried the late Les Graham who rode a 125 and 500 M.V. and 250 and 350 Velocettes that day. The Mellano race was run at the end of a cold and miserable meeting and went to John Storr (499 c.c. Norton). In '50 and '51 chairs won the Trophy-Cyril Smith and Eric Oliver. For 1953 the then Secretary of the Club, Bob Walker, thought of a new idea for awarding the Mellano Trophy which avoided all the arguments. Briefly it goes to the rider whose race average exceeds an existing class lap record by the greatest margin. Where this does not happen, it goes to the rider whose race average most closely approaches an existing class lap record. It's quite simple, really!

Cecil Sandford on a 124 c.c. M.V. was the first to collar the Mellano under this system and he won it again in 1956, three years later, on a 125 c.c. Mondial. Bob McIntyre won it in '54 on a 348 c.c. another page will be added to its already A.J.S., Cyril Smith (499 c.c. Norton-

Watsonian) in '55, Sandford again in '57 (by 0.1 m.p.h.) on the little Mondial, McIntyre on a 7R in 1958 and Mike Hailwood on sundry Ducatis in '59 and '60. Last year it was a three-wheeler's turn again, the Swiss rider Florian Camathias, who took the Trophy back to Montreux. 1962, well

The present system of running the Hutch, as a one day meeting and with "graded" races and an International permit was started in 1957, though it had been nominally International since 1952. In 1957 a special effort was made to get a good entry and other "gimmicks" were used in view of the Silver Jubilee of the event. Riders from Germany, France, Switzerland and Sweden came over and all was set for the first ever duel on English tarmacadam between Geoff Duke and John Surtees on Gilera and M.V. "fours" respectively. Unfortunately Gileras refused to let Geoff have any machines at the last minute and so John had an easy day of it. He beat Sandford's very fast Mondial in the 250 c.c. race as well. There have been some terrific scraps in recent Hutches. In 1956 Jack Brett, John Hartle and Bob McIntyre had a right good "go" in the 350 c.c. event. Two years later there was almost a dead-heat in the sidecar scratch race twixt Bill Boddice and Jack Beeton and a positively exhausting "dice" involving McIntyre and Derek Minter in the 500 event. The following year saw McIntyre involved again, this time with team mate Alistair King, in the 350 event and there was a frightening tear-up in the "slow" 350 c.c. race which Ernie Wooder won by a wheel from Rex Avery and Les James, all on Nortons. Last year's doings are too recent to require recounting, though few people are likely to forget the Camathias-Harris batle in the sidecar race or the well night dead-heat between Fred Stevens and Keith Terretta in the "slow" 500 race or the way in which the late Fred Neville dived inside Tom Thorp to snatch third place in the 500 c.c. Championship race.

The Hutch has added importance this year. It opens big time racing in Great Britain for 1962. The entry is as fine a one that has ever graced a meeting at Silverstone. The 125, 250, "fast" 350 and 500 and the first sidecar races are the 1962 B.M.C.R.C. Championship races. It is being "sponsored" for the first time by "Motor Cycling" too. No doubt illustrious history.

The Silverstone 1,000 Kilometre

Today's great meeting is not the only big motor cycle promotion at the Silverstone circuit this year. Get out that diary now and make a note of Saturday, the 19th May. That date means the Silver-stone 1000 Kilometre Race. This great event, the longest in the British Isles for any form of motor vehicle, was held for the first time and was immediately successful. So popular was it, in fact, that riders, entrants and trade representatives were unanimous in their wish to see Bemsee run the event in 1962.

Briefly, this is what happens. 50 of the finest production, and we mean production, machines from the world's factories, ridden by 100 of the country's best riders compete against each other over 215 laps of the Grand Prix course. In addition to the overall winner there are the usual capacity classes. Each machine has two riders, of course, and, most unique today in motor cycle racing, the pit work adds enormous interest to the racing. To keep you completely informed of what is going on the expert team of Bemsee commentators will be in action all the


race giving you all the latest "gen" on positions, times and speeds. One commentator will be stationed in the Pits where he will be right in the "hunt" with the fortunes of the various teams.

Last year a German B.M.W. ridden by Bruce Daniels and Peter Darvill won at over 84 m.p.h. from three Triumphs, a Velocette and an American Harley Davidson with a Japanese Honda just putting it across an Ariel Arrow in the all important 250 class. This year big twins from all the British factories will be in the lists, Triumph Bonnevilles, Norton Sports Specials and A.M.C. Sportstwins, and Italian Aer Macchis and the Hondas will compete against our own Ariel Arrows and Royal Enfield Crusaders in the 250 c.c. category. All these machines are as sold to you and I, with certain permitted modifications to make them safer and more comfortable to ride for hours at racing speeds. Naturally, too, they are all very well prepared!

Many of the famous riders you are seeing in action today will be competing. Indeed the indications are that the 1962 1000 Kilometres will be even better than the successful first event last year.

Watch the motor cycle press for full details of this exciting and fascinating event and come along on 19th May to see a real race and find out which are the hest production roadsters.





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


